What is PE and Sports Premium Funding?

All schools must use the Government funding for PE and Sports to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of Physical Education, Sport and Physical Activity (PESPA) they offer.

At St Wilfrid's we use the Primary PE and Sport Premium to:

- Develop or add to the PESPA activities that our school already offers
- Build capacity and capability within our school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining our school in future years

To support our decision making we use the revised DfE guidance including the 5 key indicators across which schools should demonstrate an improvement. This document will help us to review our provision and to report on how we spend our funding. The DfE encourages schools to use this template as an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and Sport Premium.

Under the Ofsted Framework, inspectors will assess how effectively leaders use the Primary PE and Sport Premium and measure its impact on outcomes for pupils, and how we effectively hold them to account for this.

St Wilfrid's is required to publish details of how we spend this funding as well as on the impact it has on our pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment by the end of the school year. The report below is for the academic year 2022 to 2023.

We have a balance of -£2,154.96 carried over to the next academic year.





Review and reflection - considering the 5 key indicators from DfE, what development needs are a priority for our setting and our pupils now and why?

Key achievements to date:

- In the 2022-2023 academic year, 99% of all Key Stage 2 (KS2) children and 97% of Key Stage 1 (KS1) have taken part in an intrahouse competition.
- In the 2022-2023 academic year, 56% of all KS2 children and 17% of all KS1 children have taken part in an inter-school competition.
- In the 2022-2023 academic year, 39% of all KS2 children and 35% of KS1 children took on a role as a leader.
- In the 2022-2023 academic year, 48% of all KS2 children and 52% of KS1 children took part in an after-school club.
- During the 2022-2023 academic year, Sports Premium funding has enabled us to continue to give as many children as possible the opportunity to take part in as wider range of sports as possible. It has also allowed us to continue high activity levels at playtimes through new playground equipment. We have also used it to purchase equipment that allows us to deliver a full curriculum.
- Continue to hold the Sainsbury's Platinum award.
- Achieved the Quality First Start Platinum award.
- We held and took part in a large number of intra-house and interschool competitions.
- Two teachers have attended a number of PE courses.
- Ten teachers have been released to take children to a sporting event therefore giving children the opportunity to compete against others

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- Continue to improve career professional development (CPD) with an increase in Sports Coaching or Peer support from PE coordinator based on areas identified by staff questionnaire. These areas were invasion games, lesson structure and children's leadership.
- Maintain partnership with Mid-Sussex Active allowing children to continue to be exposed to a range of opportunities.
- Continue to develop provision in KS1 and meet standards to be awarded the Quality First Start platinum plus award.
- Develop use of Sports Crew and Sports Council to further increase opportunities for leadership and promote activity throughout the school, especially in KS1.
