What is PE and Sports Premium Funding?

All schools must use the Government funding for PE and Sports to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of Physical Education, Sport and Physical Activity (PESPA) they offer.

At St Wilfrid's we use the Primary PE and Sport Premium to:

- Develop or add to the PESPA activities that our school already offers
- Build capacity and capability within our school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining our school in future years

To support our decision making we use the revised DfE guidance including the 5 key indicators across which schools should demonstrate an improvement. This document will help us to review our provision and to report on how we spend our funding. The DfE encourages schools to use this template as an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and Sport Premium.

Under the Ofsted Framework, inspectors will assess how effectively leaders use the Primary PE and Sport Premium and measure its impact on outcomes for pupils, and how we effectively hold them to account for this.

St Wilfrid's is required to publish details of how we spend this funding as well as on the impact it has on our pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment by the end of the school year. The report below is for the academic year 2021 to 2022.

•	 achievements to date: In the 2021-2022 academic year, 100% of all Key Stage 2 (KS2) children and 99% of Key Stage 1 (KS1) have taken part in an intrahouse competition. This is comprised of 100% of year 1 children and 98% of year 2 children. In the 2021-2022 academic year, 96% of all KS2 children and 59% of all KS1 children have taken part in an inter-school competition. This is comprised of 32% of year 1 children, 85% of year 2 children, 93% of year 3 and 4 children, 97% of year 5 children and 100% of year 6 children. In the 2021-2022 academic year, 56% of all KS2 children and 18% of KS1 children took on a role as a leader. This comprised of 12% of year 1 children, 23% of year 2 children, 29% of year 3 children, 54% of year 4 children, 45% of year 5 children and 79% of year 6 children. In the 2021-2022 academic year, 56% of all KS2 children and 41% of KS1 children took part in an after-school club. This was comprised of 41% of year 1 children, 42% of year 2 children, 45% of year 3 children, 80% of year 4 children, 47% of year 5 children and 53% of year 6 children. 	evia •


